Top boys' school for the third year in a row



Outstanding results have been achieved by our 2016 cohort. These results have been a culmination of the efforts of our hard-working students, extraordinary teachers, and supportive parents and significant family members.

The maximum possible ATAR of 99.95 was achieved by two of our students – congratulations to Leo Li and Ananthakrishnan Koloth.

Principal Alan Jones said the School was proud of its students'

performance. "I am delighted with the overall success of our students. One of the special things about Christ Church is that we are an academically inclusive school – we value diversity and accept boys of all abilities. So many of our boys have demonstrated academic excellence and achievements across the co-curricular and sporting arenas. A time capsule for 2045

In 1988, the Year 7 class buried a time capsule with notes and memorabilia that was exhumed in November 2016. With much intrigue and laughter, 12 old boys came together for the historic occasion (one flying from Hong Kong) to attend and uncover the letters and magazines, amongst other forgotten treasures.

In Term 4, the Year 6 Class of 2016 continued this tradition, burying their own time capsule to be exhumed in 2045.

"The burying of a time capsule is a special moment, when the present is buried and made into history. This is a moment in time when you can't help but think about how you will turn out in 40 years, and how not only your life, but the world around you will have changed," said Samuel English (Year 6).

"In our time capsule we have included items that show what life is like for a Christ Church boy in 2016. Every Year 6 boy has completed a questionnaire, responding to different questions about himself, and written a self-addressed letter. The Year 6 cohort also suggested items to be included, such as the latest *Mitre* which shows what we have been up to in recent years, parts of the current school uniform, photographs of the students and the School, and a canteen menu to compare with the future menu," said Kenneth Lo (Year 6).

Year 11 and 12 students from Christ Church and Methodist Ladies' College returned to the School in December to run the 11th Sony Foundation Children's Holiday Camp.



The three-day camp provided students with an opportunity to care for a child with special needs, treating them to a fun weekend of activities and providing some much needed respite for parents, guardians and siblings.

Over 30 students volunteered as companions and assistants, supported by a large team of Christ Church and MLC staff. They were responsible for 24 children over the course of the camp and quickly learned about the challenges and demands of caring for a child with a disability.

Service Captain for 2016 and recent graduate James Borshoff said, "It was a privilege to work with the children over the three days. Caring for them for 24 hours a day meant we quickly learned about the challenges and demands involved in caring for a child with special needs. I am pleased that we gave the parents and primary carers respite."

The children enjoyed activities which included face painting, water activities in the CCGS pool, surfing at Port Beach, cooking, a fire truck visit, music, art and science activities and a disco night. Family members were invited to attend a Christmas lunch on the final day, which included a visit from Father Christmas.

Many thanks to past and present staff and students from Christ Church and Methodist Ladies' College, who dedicated time to the camp. The children had a fantastic time, which would not have been possible without the support of these selfless individuals.

Exceptional art in the Senior School

The Senior School Art Exhibition, held in Term 4 each year, showcases exceptional work by our Visual Arts, Design and Media students.

The 2016 exhibition included interactive elements via projections, movies, soundscapes and levitation sculptures. These, along with refined artworks in the form of photography, painting, prints and ceramics, made for intriguing viewing and provided an insight into the creatives here at Christ Church.

Christ Church will have three works on show as part of the Year 12 Perspectives exhibition at the Art Gallery of Western Australia. George Gare, Christian Wong and Jack Retallack are among WA's top art students selected in this year's exhibition on display from 28 January to 2 April 2017.

We are also pleased to share that recent graduate Tom Pennell, has been chosen for Media Perspectives 2017, a brilliant showcase of top talent from Year 12 media students across WA. Tom's five-minute short film, a modern interpretation of TS Eliot's *The Love Song of J Alfred Prufrock*, will be screened at Innaloo Cinemas on 15 March, Grand Cinemas Bunbury on 29 March, and Reading Cinemas Mandurah on 10 May. "I think the greatest aspect of J Alfred Prufrock being chosen for screening with Perspectives is that it provides an opportunity for young filmmakers to gain exposure in the film industry. For me, I'm stoked with such an outcome because the steps between amateur and professional filmmaking are colossal, as such, any exposure is good exposure", said Tom.
