After the match, a cool down and recovery session was held involving a BBQ, cold beers and plenty of banter as the enemies became mates again.

Ashton Turner ('10) has been selected as the Vice-Captain of the Western Warriors cricket team. Ashton has remained actively involved with the School since leaving in 2010, appearing as a guest speaker and coaching.

Christophe Karas ('02) has been appointed Music Director of St George's College, UWA. Christophe recently graduated from the University of Cambridge with a Master of Music in Choral Studies, after qualifying with a Bachelor of Music from UWA in 2009.

The Flametree SRS Wallcliffe chardonnay 2016 was classed the best wine of the show. "This represents the incredible wine making skills at Flametree Wines and the greater Margaret River region," said Rob.

Mark Alderson ('79) is the director for three vaccine development programs at PATH, a global health organisation based in Seattle. His projects address Streptococcus pneumonia (pneumococcus), meningococcal meningitis and Group B Streptococcus.

"Pneumonia is the number one killer of children under the age of 5 and Streptococcus pneumonia (pneumococcus) is the leading cause of pneumonia. New vaccines are needed that are more affordable and can provide either focused protection for children against strains prevalent in the developing world or broad protection across all pneumococcal strains. PATH is taking a two-pronged approach to accelerate the development of new pneumococcal vaccines that will be effective, affordable, and sustainably accessible in the countries that most urgently need them. Our lead pneumococcal vaccine is in a phase 3 trial in Africa," says Mark.

"The second project is to develop a polyvalent meningococcal vaccine for the meningitis belt in Africa. A vaccine against the meningitis A type has virtually eliminated disease caused by this bacterium in meningitis belt countries. In partnership with the Serum Institute of India, we are working on a second generation vaccine that will cover the C, W, X and Y types in addition to A. This pentavalent vaccine has the potential to eliminate meningococcal meningitis from meningitis belt countries. The vaccine is about to enter a phase 2 trial in Africa."

"Finally, we have just commenced work on a Group B Streptococcus (GBS) vaccine. GBS primarily causes disease in very young infants so the idea is to vaccinate pregnant women who will pass on protective antibodies through the placenta to their babies and protect them in the first three months of life. This project is preclinical at the moment."
