The very same theatre in which ABBA won Eurovision in 1974.

In some aspects, the school was much more like a University than Christ Church. They had a few lecture halls and two lounge cafes. There was also a brand new music department with many great facilities which included an amazing music hall with a Fazioli grand piano worth roughly \$300 000. All opened last year by David Gilmore himself.

In total, the exchange experience was one of the best things I've ever done. I made so many new friends that I will miss greatly, as well as discovering various new opportunities for the future.
