New website

The School's new website and Building Good Men website (https://bgm.ccgs.wa.edu.au/) have been launched. The BGM initiative was conceived in response to parents continually reflecting back to us that they want the School to be a partner and assist in aspects of their boy's mental, physical and spiritual development as well as their academic journey. BGM provides the community with greater visibility and access to the work of the Centre for Pedagogy and The Wynne Centre for Boys' Health and Wellbeing.

Commissioning

Rev Nicholas Russell was commissioned on Thursday 1 March 2018 by the Archbishop of Perth at a whole school assembly. This was also a wonderful celebration of the School's birthday and acknowledgement of long serving staff members.

OQD Program

The first group of boys have completed the Year 9 residential program, part of The Making of Men year long program. The program has launched successfully and gained much traction with the boys and their parents rating it highly.

Coding

Coding has been introduced into the Prep School as a subject from 2018. This is in line with our Strategic Plan and move to a scope and sequence of all subjects from K to Year 12.

International Women's Day

The School will celebrate and acknowledge International Women's Day (IWD) on Thursday 8 March 2018 with a special presentation at the Senior School Principal's Assembly. Students have been asked to participate in a short video by sharing how they feel about the significant females in their lives. We have also included brief interviews with representatives of the Western Australian United Nations Association of Australia who have thanked the School for acknowledging IWD.

Perth Modern

Ten of Perth Modern's fifteen board members have stepped down, with five departing the school within the same week. This follows a stand-off last year in which two-thirds of the school's board called for the school's principal, Lois Joll, to be dismissed for using \$9m of the school's funds towards a 700-seat auditorium. The latest departures mean that all board members who had expressed no-confidence in Joll are no longer at the school. In 2017, WA Education Director-General, Sharyn O'Neill, appointed professional services firm KPMG to carry out an independent

review of governance arrangements on Joll's plans to construct the auditorium. "There were 10 recommendations made in the report and I've accepted all of them," O'Neill said, adding that she expected the school executive and boards to "work together towards achieving a common goal in the best interests of the students". "The principal has led Perth Modern School to be one of the highest performing schools in Australia which is a significant achievement. Together with a highly expert and committed board, I believe we can implement the recommendations." The review also acknowledged that clearer direction was needed on financial management and governance of capital works projects in WA schools.

Preschool funding boost

The Turnbull Government has locked in a \$440m funding boost for preschool education and is urging states to boost the enrolment and attendance rates of preschoolers in early learning. Minister for Education and Training, Simon Birmingham, said the extra funding would extend the National Partnership on Universal Access to Early Childhood Education into 2019 to more than 348,000 children to ensure they have access to 15 hours of quality early learning in the year before they start school.





Marcus makes his mark on Mars

Marcus Handley went on a mission to Mars this month.

The Christ Church Grammar School student's team just missed out on winning a worldwide coding competition at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Marcus (15) was the youngest member of his team in the Battlecode competition as they took on more than 1000 others before losing to a Swedish team. "The competition started in January and finished this month," Marcus said.

"Three rounds were online and the last was at MIT's Kresge Auditorium.

"Battlecode involved using different units, forming them with others, and attacking others.

"This year's theme was Escape to Mars, otherwise you'd be wiped out by a great flood."

"I dabble in a couple of others," he said.

"I got into coding in Year 8 and have found it a really rewarding activity; it's probably my biggest passion and hobby."

He said coding was a growing industry but he wasn't sure that would always be the case.

"Artificial intelligence means the demand for coders could be reduced by code that writes itself," he said.

"These days I don't think there's any career that is secure." While at MIT, Marcus met repre-

While at MIT, Marcus met representatives of Battlecode sponsors including Facebook, Oracle, and Hudson River Trading.

"I also took the opportunity to attend an information session and tours for Harvard and MIT," he said.

"The MIT tour and information session were very interesting, and MIT's research and interdisciplinary-focused approach are very appealing to me.

"I am under no illusions regarding how hard it would be to get into MIT.

"They get more than 20,000 applications each year for about 1450 spots; and only around 10% of those spots go to international students.

"However, I think that just going through the process of applying would be a good experience for me."

Marcus's team shared a \$7800 prize for their Battlecode performance.
