

The bow was offered to Trevor when he was Captain of Boats and McClemans House Boarding Captain. Housed in the farm shed since then, the bow needed plenty of love to eliminate wood rot and restore the original gold leaf signage of the name WJ McClemens (misspelt as it was originally). 2007 Representing Christ Church Old Boys' **Hamish Rose** and his crew made it through to the Mens' A-Final in the PSA Elizabeth Quay Regatta but were beaten by a canvas in the Final to WA Rowing Club. "Most importantly though, we beat Scotch old boys!" said Hamish. The crew comprised of Henry Chandler, Sam Morgan, James McQuillan, Dave Latham, Hamish Rose, Jacob Marsh, Peter Adam, Owain Chandler and Simon Cox.

1976 The title of the Dragon State Championships came down to the wire in the final race as **Willy Packer** and **Peter Gilmour**, together with their respective teams, called on their best match racing skills in a nail biting finish. The winner on count back, Willy Packer, with Peter Gilmour placing 2nd and Peter Bowman in 3rd place. Congratulations to Hamish Carnachan ('79), David Yu ('86) and Grant Alderson ('83) who took out the Tally Hobbs Memorial Trophy.

1969 As a member of the Perth Male Voice Choir, **Marshall Willan** joined an international choir at the Festival of Choirs at Royal Albert Hall in October, joined by 15 other choirs from six countries. Each choir received 20 songs to memorise, eight of them in the Welsh language - no easy feat! A 'warm up' tour included five performances throughout Wales.

"From the word go we stepped up to the mark and sang like never before. We were under pressure, being on our own without the accompaniment of 15 other choirs. In short, we performed excellently - did ourselves proud and the Welsh audiences (full houses) loved us, particularly when we sang in their language. They were amazed that an Australian choir could rise to such a difficult height. Tears were very apparent, so enraptured were they."

"Fast forward to 13 October, the big night at Royal Albert Hall and an occasion not one of us had experienced. We were accompanied by the Royal Welsh Guards no less and with acoustics unequalled, it promised through our two rehearsals prior to be an evening to remember. It was. With 800 voices, tenors and basses combining as one, it really was an exceptional sound. There was a full house of 5000 who, upon our conclusion of Land of our Fathers, the Welsh national anthem, gave us a standing ovation. It brought tears of sheer wonder to most of us, an experience never to forget." "Not bad for an eclectic, ordinary bunch of men from the suburbs of Perth. Will we ever forget it?....I don't think so."

1958 David Steadman (Dag), together with 65 others. drawn from four metro 'Born to Sing' choirs, flew into Edinburgh, Scotland, in August to perform four sold out concerts to some 850 attendees at the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. "All in all, we raised £6,500 (\$10,000 AUD) for four different Scottish charities and have been invited back to sing at any point in the future. This wonderful trip was two years in the making and over \$20,000 was raised by our choirs to fund the preparation and production cost. Our choir members wore specially designed Indigenous themed performance costumes and were advertised as 'kangaroos and bagpipes.' To have seen the Royal Military Tattoo in that Edinburgh castle environment was just supreme!"
